

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Community Renewable Energy

- Locally owned renewable energy projects.
 - Revenue stays in local community
 - Low impact Hydro, Bio Mass, Geothermal, Wave, Community Scale Wind, net metering projects

- Small impact compared to large commercial renewable projects.
- Require same local siting considerations as larger (sub EFSC) projects
- Becoming a major interest throughout the United States

Obstacles to Renewable Energy

- The largest obstacle to Renewable Energy in the US is confused Federal
 and State policies that contradict each other
- Federal and State governments promote Renewable Energy as a major energy policy that provides local jobs and revenue, helps us get us off of fossil fuels, and adds diversification to local power grids.
- However, Regional government Agencies are not in sync with federal and state policies. Instead, they have imposed local restrictions that have halted numerous renewable projects in Oregon.
- DOD, FAA, USFWS, BLM, ODFW have all imposed crippling uncoordinated policy mandates with little attempt to coordinate with the Renewables Industry to seek mutually satisfactory solutions to complex issues.

Economic Benefits from Renewables

Oregon Renewables have resulted in the largest economic boast to Oregon since the boom days of fishing and timber.

They have helped reverse the loss of population to declining rural communities, brought significant financial stabilization to local farming, and provided new jobs and state revenues at a time when the Oregon budget severely needs financial strengthening.
