#### Welcome and Oregon Solutions Process Review

Convener John Nohr welcomed the Implementation Committee to its second of three OS project team meetings. Jessie Conover (OS) reviewed the Meeting #1 notes, the OS ground rules, and the goals that the Implementation Committee developed at its first meeting. See the Meeting #1 notes for more details.

As the Oregon Solutions process comes to a close this Fall, the group will craft a Declaration of Cooperation. OS will draft the narrative sections, with review from IC members, and IC members will draft their own statements of commitment. Jessie passed out statement templates and will distribute an example from another project. Though the format has evolved over the years, there are several DoCs available on the Oregon Solutions website. ## Updates

The first Train-the-Trainer session is scheduled for November 6 & 7 at DPSST in Salem. Lodging is available for trainers traveling long distances. More information is forthcoming. Send your list of confirmed trainers to Heather Laird and she will coordinate with FHWA and DPSST to finalize details.

Nathaniel gave a brief update from the FHWA perspective. The group called for more specific training materials. Nathaniel will find and distribute module information and a training outline (see Action Item #5).

Darin Weaver described a grant that FHWA awarded for focused improvements in incident management in the Portland region. They hope to demonstrate success. The grant team (ODOT/Metro) hopes it will be used for:

- 1) Establishing a Portland-area TIM Team
- 2) Developing a professional communications plan
- 3) Implementing communications plan
- 4) Peer exchange
- 5) Research on communication system interoperability

#### Train the Trainer

Team members determined that there would be two (2) train the trainer sessions over the next 12 months. The first training is scheduled for November 2013. The group would like to aim for another train the trainer session in the Spring of 2014 outside of the Willamette Valley in either Bend, Medford or LaGrande. ODOT will act as the lead in conjunction with the implementation committee.

To do outreach properly, the Implementation Committee needs:

- 1) Oregon-specific talking points
- 2) A packet of information so we can have consistent messaging across the state
- 3) An understanding of the training material and its key added value

### Implementation Committee Vision Exercise

Each IC member gave a brief statement of their hopes for the committee in one year. They are roughly captured below:

- Have done a Train-the-Trainer and a couple of responder trainings
- Fold the training material into private sector policies (e.g. ambulance)
- Continue communication between ODOT/FHWA and rest of group
- Statewide awareness of TIM
- Possible connection to policymaking groups
- Putting classes into policy and in culture (like HAZMAT has been)
- More regional TIM teams as venue to keep progress going
- Have rural services get the need for collaborative
- Incorporate training w/ OSP in-service training
- Do a good job selling the concept so responders actively seek out training
- Consistent faces in the group
- IC still meeting
- Figure out training request management system
- Be at the table and getting the message out
- Intercoordination, working with everyone
- Start discussion on clearance thought process
- Online training available
- Clarity around logistics
- Impressed with cooperative nature of group
- 2-way street of refinement (state implementation and ODOT)
- Consistent program implemented around the state
