Ochoco	Property boundary surveying on Gap and Edge timber sales. Establishes line between public and private land.	\$90,000	IDIQ Contractor
Malheur	<u>LiDAR acquisition</u> & <u>stand exams</u> to support collaborative/research on Canyon Creek Complex.	\$178,200	IGA w/ DOGAMI; ODF Contract
Willamette	Road surveys for upcoming timber sales. ODF will gather data to inform USFS contracting to access NEPA-ready timber sales.	\$75,000	ODF Seasonal Crew
Siuslaw	Marbeled murrelet surveys. Intent to extend operating season on existing sale areas.	\$115,000	ODF Contract
RogueRS	Heritage resource surveys: Agnes project. Protocol shift to survey treatment units only.	\$35,000	IDIQ Contractor

Good Neighbor Authority

- Authorized by 2014 Farm Bill and Appropriations Bill
 - Effectively allows states to implement actions on federal forests
 - Federal agency retains Decision-making authority
- Two-tiered agreement. In Oregon:
 - *Master Agreement:* Governor and Regional Forester to sign w/ State Forester & ODFW Director
 - Supplemental Project Agreements: District Foresters / Forest Supervisors sign
- Federal dollars routed through state agencies
 - ODF will need spending limitation
 - Includes timber sale receipts to recoup state costs

Good Neighbor Authority

- Wide range of possible roles:
 - Data collection (stand exams, heritage surveys)
 - NEPA Team Participation (Fire & Fuels, Fish Bio)
 - Pre-sale assistance (unit layout, timber marking)
 - Timber sale administration
 - Contract administration (non-commercial activities)
 - Treatment implementation (pre-commercial thin, pile, Rx burn)
 - Aquatic habitat monitoring and restoration (ODFW)
 - Any other Federal-State business (ie. detection cameras)
- Out of the gate ideas:
 - SOD treatments on the RogueRS
 - Pre-commercial thinning on the FreWin

A new ODF program

- · Core business statement:
 - Accelerate the pace, scale and quality of forest restoration to increase the resilience of Oregon's federal forests, in a manner that leverages collaborative efforts and contributes to the long-term vitality of regional economies and rural communities.
